BOOK PROJECT

Where the Streets Are Paved with Gold: Immigrants' Racial Attitudes in a Land of Inequality

On average, immigrants of all racial and ethnic groups have more negative attitudes toward Black Americans than do their US-born co-ethnics. In this project, I use original survey data to document these differences and to examine their causes and consequences. I argue that immigrants' racial attitudes are primarily a function of their heightened optimism about the United States relative to native-borns, which leads them to believe that Black Americans are not sufficiently availing themselves of American opportunity.
